

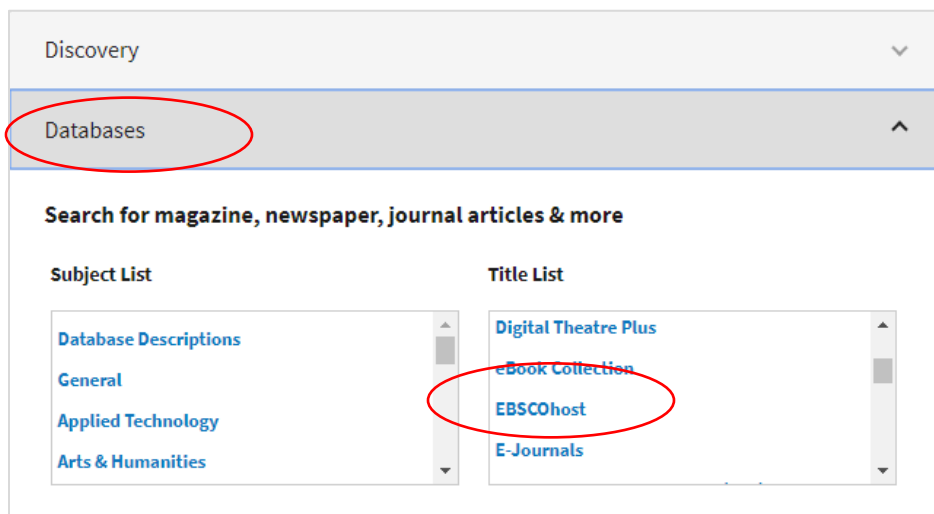
EBSCOHOST DATABASES

Several of the library's research databases are available through the EBSCOhost interface. These databases contain articles (magazines, newspapers, journals) as well as other sources.

Refer to the **MCC Research Databases** guide for a list of EBSCOhost databases.

ACCESS EBSCOHOST

1. Go the MCC library website: www.mccneb.edu/library
2. Click on the box labeled **Databases**



3. Two options are available:
 - a. Search an **individual** database: use the **Title List** to select the database name.
 - b. Search **multiple** EBSCOhost databases at once: use the **Title list** to select **EBSCOhost**.
4. **Search multiple databases:** If you select this option, the next screen displays a list of databases.
Select the databases you want to search or click **Select/deselect all**.

Then click **Continue**



SEARCH EBSCOHOST

Type your search terms in the **search box** then click **Search**

1. Put **quotation marks** around any search phrase or exact combination of keywords.
Example 1: “school violence”
Example 2: “gun control”
2. Use **AND** between two keywords or phrases to find articles containing **both** terms.
Example: “video games” AND violence
3. Use **OR** between keywords to find articles containing **either** term.
Example 1: “capital punishment” OR “death penalty”
Example 2: vaping OR “electronic cigarettes”
4. By default EBSCOhost puts an **AND** in between the search boxes. Use the pull-down menus to change it.

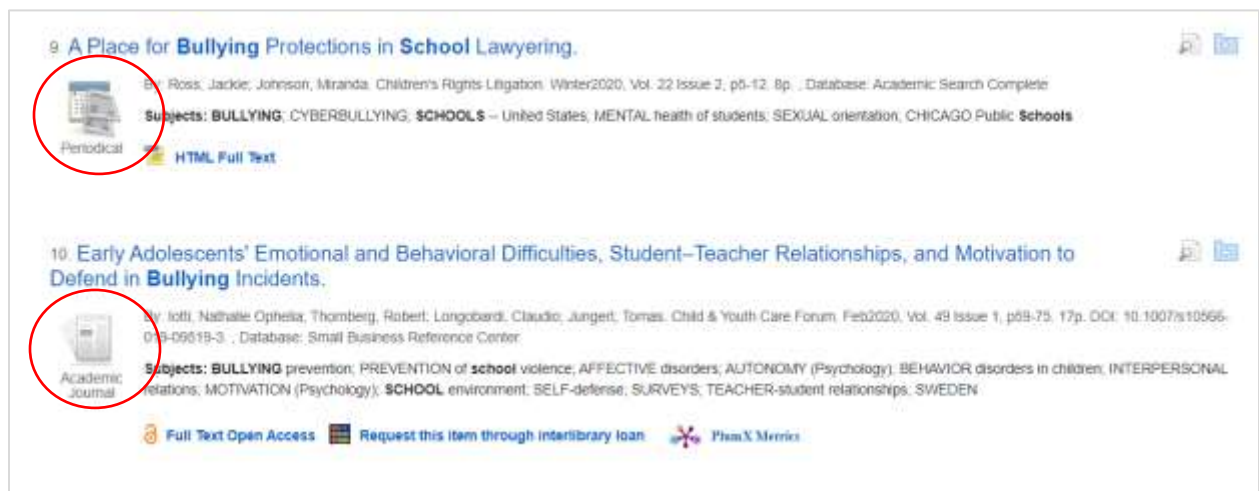


SEARCH RESULTS LIST

1. The search results page typically displays 30 records (search results) per page. Click on the page numbers at the bottom of the screen to view additional results.



2. To the left of each record you'll see an icon identifying the source type including eBook, academic journal, or periodical (meaning magazine).



3. Look beneath each record for full-text options (the whole thing that you can read). See Finding Full Text below.
4. On the left side of the page is a column of options to limit your search results:
 - o Full Text: eliminates records that are not available full-text
 - o Scholarly (Peer Reviewed) Journals: eliminates other sources including magazine and newspaper articles.
 - o Publication date

DETAILED RECORD

Click on an article title to open the **Detailed Record** which includes:

1. Authors, source name, volume, issue, page numbers, publication date, etc.
2. Abstract, or summary of the article's content. Read this before you spend too much time trying to locate or read the full-text.
3. DOI and accession number (needed for your citation)
4. Database name

Abstract: Although it is well understood that relationships are linked to healthy development and academic success, research on socialization during recess is limited. From the conceptual framework of belonging, an array of established measures was used to create an online anonymous survey specific to recess. This survey includes modified scales for belongingness, affect, and victimization and discrete items about the social and physical setting. The survey was completed by 520 students from grades 4 through 8. Exploratory and confirmatory factor analyses revealed an excellent fit of the belongingness scale to the data. Victimization related inversely to belongingness and positive affect and predicted negative affect and low belongingness. The article concludes with implications and recommendations for researchers and **school**-based professionals. [ABSTRACT FROM AUTHOR]

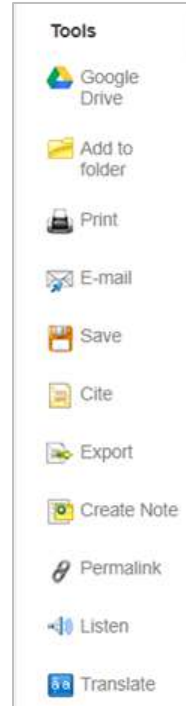
